

The verb you use in a sentence must match the subject.  
If there is a singular subject, then you would add **s** or **es** to the verb.

Examples: The dentist **looks** for cavities. (There is one dentist.)  
The car **crosses** the street. (There is one car.)

If there is a plural subject, then you would not add **s** or **es** to the verb.

Examples: The dentists **look** for cavities. (There is more than one dentist.)  
The cars **cross** the street. (There is more than one car.)

When the subject is the pronoun **I** or **you**, then you would not add **s** or **es** to the verb.

Examples: You **look** for a book to read.  
I **cross** a busy street on the way to the restaurant.
