**Context clues** are *hints to the meaning* of a difficult word or phrase. These hints can be in the same sentence or in the sentences before or after the sentence that uses the difficult word or phrase.

As you read the story, pay attention to the underlined words, and any *hints to the meaning* of these words.

None of the Forest and Meadow people liked Reddy Fox very much these days, anyway, and they were getting so tired of his boasting that they just ached to see him get into trouble. When Farmer Brown's boy found out about his pet chicken, and heard about the boldness of Reddy Fox, he shut his mouth tight in a way that was unpleasant to see and reached for his gun.
