Drawing conclusions means figuring something out for yourself. To draw conclusions, you need to think about what *makes the most sense*.

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Here are some examples of things you can figure out for yourself. Put an X in the box for the **conclusion** that *makes the most sense*.

1. Paulina took her homework and a pencil out of her backpack. This probably means that:



Paulina is going out to play.

Paulina is going to do her homework.

2. Charlie threw a tennis ball across the yard and called, "Fetch, Pebbles!"

This probably means that:



Charlie is playing with his dog.

Charlie is playing soccer with his friend Carlos.



3. Kelli blew out the candles on the cake. This probably means that:



It is Kelli's birthday.



It is Christmas morning.

4. Chandra stayed home from school, even though there was a play rehearsal that day. This probably means that:



It is summer vacation.

Chandra is sick.

5. Carl filled a big bag with a towel, a toy shovel and pail, and a Frisbee.

This probably means that:



Carl's family is going to the beach.



Carl's family is going out for a pizza dinner.
