

Using context clues

Grade 3 Reading Worksheet

Context clues are hints that readers use to find the meaning of unknown words. There are different types of context clues, including:

- **Definition Clues:** The word is defined in the sentence or nearby sentences.
- **Antonym Clues:** The sentence or a nearby sentence gives a word that means the opposite.
- **Synonym Clues:** The sentence or a nearby sentence gives a word that means the same or almost the same.
- **Example Clues:** The sentence or a nearby sentence gives an example to help explain the word.



As you read the story, look for context clues that help explain the meaning of the underlined words.

A Closer Look at Weather Forecasting

Paragraph 1

Have you ever watched the news and seen a weather person talking about the forecast? Instead of being surprised by the weather, the forecast helps people know what to expect.

Paragraph 2

Weather forecasts are usually given by meteorologists. Meteorologists are people who study the sky, the air and the seasons to help us understand the weather. They look at clouds, wind and temperature to make predictions. Without them, we wouldn't know when to bring an umbrella or when a big storm is on the way!



Paragraph 3

Meteorologists use many tools to do their jobs. A barometer helps them understand changes in the atmosphere, or air. A hygrometer tells them how much moisture is in the atmosphere. Meteorologists also use radar to track storms and find out where rain or snow is falling. A satellite, or space camera, takes pictures of clouds and large weather patterns. These tools help weather experts gather information so they can warn people about dangerous storms or sudden changes in temperature.

Paragraph 4

Some weather changes happen rapidly, like a thunderstorm appearing out of the blue on a sunny afternoon. Others happen slowly, like the seasons changing from summer to fall. Meteorologists can't be careless; they have to be attentive to all of these changes so they can make the best weather predictions.

Paragraph 5

The weather report is important for many people. Farmers need to know when to plant crops. Pilots need to know if it is safe to fly. Athletes and event planners check the forecast to see if they need to move activities indoors. Thanks to meteorologists, we can all be more prepared.
